# **COVID-19 CARES Act and FEMA Funding Updates**

Ms. Powell discussed the opportunity to leverage the CARES Act for property tax relief, explaining that the City's allocation was determined by population. When considering the opportunity for property tax relief, and based on the guidelines for use, the City will not be permitted to increase taxes by any growth factor beyond the amount already certified – other than that associated with new construction, and will be unable to levy 3% or use any previous forgone. When applying this to the City of Blackfoot, Ms. Powell reviewed the L-2 with Council, explaining that approximately \$850,000 will be allocated for subsidizing public safety costs. If utilized, the City, in turn, would agree to pass these monies off as a property tax savings for this year. Ms. Powell stated the City is able to opt-out should we determine that we don't want to utilize these funds. As such, and after comments from Mayor Carroll concerning the proposed budget, Councilman Brown motioned to file a notice of intent with the State of Idaho, Councilman Gardner seconded; all were in favor, motion carried.

# Presentation and Adoption of Proposed Tentative FY 2021 Budget

Ms. Powell explained to Council that the proposed budget includes a 2.1% COLA for all employees as well as a reduction in the buffer allocated for employee health benefits. The proposed budget also includes capital expenditures that were submitted. At this time, the levy rate is slightly lower than in the previous year. Ms. Powell then reviewed each of the departmental budgets individually. Councilman Gardner motioned to accept the tentative budget with the 3% levy included, Councilwoman Simpson seconded; all were in favor, motion carried.

#### **MAYOR MARC CARROLL**

# Proposed Contract from ITD for the Blackfoot Transportation Plan

Mayor Carroll reviewed the background and requirements for Cities to periodically conduct a city-wide transportation plan that will consider the City's street and transportation infrastructure and its ability to appropriately serve the City. This grant, through the Idaho Department of Transportation, requires a 7.34% match from the City, which is approximately \$6,850. Councilman Brown motioned to approve the proposed contract to proceed with the Transportation Plan grant, Councilman Gardner seconded; all were in favor, motion carried.

#### **COVID-19 Status and Discussion**

Mayor Carroll updated Council on Governor Little's Order, informing them that Stage 4 was extended through July 11<sup>th</sup>, with the presumption that this will again be extended. Stage 4 criteria allow for gatherings of up to 50 individuals, as long as social distancing is maintained. In addition, senior centers, corrections and detention facilities are now open to visitors. Our geographic area, which is a part of Public Health District 6, now has 223 confirmed cases, an increase of 172 in the last 30 days. Of those 223 cases, Bingham County has 73 confirmed cases and one death. Mayor Carroll also explained that there is one current confirmed case of a City employee, who is at home under quarantine.

Currently, there are seven Cities in Idaho who have mandated the use of face coverings in public places. According to Attorney Sandow, the ordinances are written in a broad manner so that they include any location, indoor or outdoor,

that are open to the public. Mayor Carroll contacted Mayors Blad and Casper and understands they will be discussing this issue at their respective City Council meetings. Enforcement may prove to be difficult, and Mayor Carroll would like to have a discussion among Council to get their perspective on mandating the use of face coverings in the City. Councilwoman Simpson understands that it would be difficult to enforce, but feels there should be a mandate for face coverings in public places, as does Councilman Gardner. Councilman Brown and Councilman Jensen feel as though a mandate is not needed and believe that it is government over-reach. Mayor Carroll committed to obtain additional information for Council to review at the August meeting.

Mayor Carroll discussed his attendance at the Eastern Idaho State Fair (EISF) Board meeting where an initial go/no go decision to conduct the fair was discussed, and he did not feel it was contentious in any way. The EISF Fair Board voted to continue forward with the EISF at this time and provided Mayor Carroll with a 30-page COVID-19 plan. Mayor Carroll will review the proposal with Maggie Mann of the SEIPH and others within the City, after which he will meet with Brandon Bird to discuss shortcomings and issues related to the proposal. Mayor Carroll and Councilmembers had a discussion about their concerns, and the Mayor shared the fact that he received approximately 150 communications, via email or phone, and the majority were in support of cancelling the EISF. General feelings expressed by Council supported the Mayor's position to move forward with a declaration to disallow the EISF, if necessary.

Councilman Gardner motioned to accept proposed Ordinance No. 2193 as read and waive all further readings, Councilwoman Simpson seconded; roll call was taken and all were in favor, motion carried.

**ORDINANCE NO. 2193** 

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BLACKFOOT, IDAHO, AMENDING 1-5-3 REGARDING THE OFFICIAL NEWSPAPER OF THE CITY; PROVIDING FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF SAID CHANGE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLACKFOOT, IDAHO AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That Section 1-5-3 of the Blackfoot City Code be amended as follows:

# 1-5-3 OFFICIAL NEWSPAPER:

The Morning News, <u>Bingham News Chronicle</u>, a daily newspaper published at and within the city, hereby is designated and appointed as the official newspaper of the city.

SECTION 2: That the effective date of this Ordinance shall be after passage and publication as provided by law.

# **COVID-19 Updates to City Hall**
